

"The Importance of Hybridization in the Systematic Evolution of Oaks"

Tuesday, November 29, 7:30 pm White Oak Library – Large Meeting Room

The oaks are one of North America's most widespread and important trees. Nearly 80 native species of oaks occur in North America, not including the numerous natural hybrids and app. 100 species in Mexico. Maryland is one of the most diverse areas in the east for oaks, with 21 of the 41 oak species native to the eastern U.S., not including hybrids. Join Alan Whittemore, research botanist and systematic taxonomist with the USDA and *Flora of North America* contributor, for a presentation on the evolution, diversity, and importance of oak species.

You may have noticed that we added a new membership category for organizations. Yearly membership dues of \$50 gives an organization the privilege of being listed as an organizational member of the Society, receive our publications, and receive membership discounts for three employees. As an organizational member, the Society will acknowledge your organization at least yearly, and allow you to publicize some of your events that would be of interest to our members in Native News (space permitting and if received in a timely fashion). Fall Field Trips

Beach to Bay, Assateague Island Nat. Seashore

Date: Saturday, November 5 Time: 1:45 pm A naturalist from the National Park Service will lead us on a special two hour interpretive program called "Beach to Bay." A hike through the diverse barrier island habitats will highlight various living organisms and their interactions, with an emphasis on plants.

Directions: Directions will be provided to those who have registered for the program. Carpool Info: If anyone has an interest in carpooling, please mention it when you sign up. **Bring:** Dress in layers, including windbreaker or raincoat, as weather on the island tends to be a bit cooler and breezier than the mainland. Boots or good walking shoes are a must. Water and snack recommended. Field guides and binoculars are optional. **Note:** The program has a limit on the number of participants that may take part. Date: Sunday. November 6 **Time:** 10:00 am – 3:00 pm Leakin Park is a mature forest on the west side of Baltimore City. It is an unusually high-quality urban forest that is not dominated my invasive plants. We will explore winter tree identification and look for late fall composites.

Directions: From the Baltimore beltway (I-695), exit onto I-70 East (toward the Park and Ride) and take the first exit onto Security Blvd. Then take the first right (a small street leading to Franklintown Rd) and then turn right onto Franklintown Rd. Proceed for about 1.3 to the parking lot on the left.

Bring: Lunch and water. Binoculars might be handy. Note: Rain or shine.
