Yes, the regs for the bill haven't been written yet, but the bill includes a definition that says $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{C} \mathbb{N}$ ative plant means a plant that occurs naturally $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$ without direct or indirect human actions. $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$ This wording excludes cultivars except for one provision that was added to enable the bill to pass: $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{C} \mathbb{N}$ when a cultivar or hybrid of a Native Plant fills an ecological niche that a Native Plant is no longer able to fill due to widespread attack by disease or insects, the [UME] Native Plant Specialist shall first receive input from the Department of Natural Resources and the Maryland Native Plant Society and then inform and guide the Department in evaluating the cultivar or hybrid of a Native Plant for inclusion on the Commercial Maryland Native Plant List. $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$ 19:54:37 From Liz Humes to Everyone:
